ICOP Video Shows How SC Sheriff's Deputy Overcomes Gunfire Exchange with Violent Criminal



On Saturday, April 12, 2008, FOX's *America's Most Wanted* aired a story about a sheriff's deputy from South Carolina, whose quick thinking and steadiness under fire (at extreme close range) brought down a dangerous suspect. Most of the footage of this exchange of gunfire was captured on the deputy's ICOP Model 20/20®-W installed in his patrol vehicle.

According to a related published article, posted on *America's Most Wanted* web site, "18 years of law enforcement experience has taught Sergeant Randy Botten of the Dorchester County (South Carolina) Sheriff's Office how to deal with almost any situation. His training and skills were put to the test last August when he responded to a silent house alarm and was ambushed by an armed suspect with a violent criminal history. The suspect jumped from his vehicle and opened fire on Sgt. Botten. The veteran lawman returned the fire, striking the gunman in the arm and ending the threat."

Continuing, the article noted, "Randy Botten's brave actions that day have already been recognized with the 'Officer of the Year 2007' award from the Elks Lodge. Now, he's become the seventh of eight weekly finalists to be chosen by the public in the AMW All-Star Contest, which honors the nation's first responders."

2nd Annual True American Hero Benefit Motorcycle Ride in Sarasota, Florida
2008 National Law Ride in Washington, D.C.



On Saturday, February 23, 2008, ICOP served as a proud host sponsor of the **2nd Annual True American Hero Benefit Motorcycle Ride** hosted by Sprint Nextel in Sarasota, Florida. Honoring the memory of 16 Florida law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty during 2007, the benefit brought together more than 500 motorcycle enthusiasts, law enforcement officials, family members and celebrities, including *America's Most Wanted* hosted John Walsh who served as Grand Marshall. All proceeds from the event benefited the True American Hero Fund, which is dedicated to providing support to the families of Florida's law enforcement officers who have sacrificed their lives in the past year.

On May 11, 2008 in Washington, D.C., an estimated 1,100 motorcycle riders – among them, ICOP's Jay Dalrymple and Jack Loughran, along with U.S. Transportation Secretary Mary Peters – made the annual trek from RFK Stadium to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial for the **13th Annual Law Ride and Wreath Laying Ceremony**. This marked the second consecutive year that ICOP has supported this important occasion. The Law Ride, one of many events that comprise National Police Week, paid tribute to law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. At the closing ceremony, Jack Loughran had the privilege of placing one of four wreaths at the Memorial's center medallion in honor of fallen law enforcement officers from all four regions of the country. Secretary Peters then presented Jack with her Department's challenge coin, expressing her personal gratitude to ICOP for its strong support of our nation's law enforcement.

WHY QUALITY MATTERS.....

A K-9 Sheriff's patrol vehicle was stolen during a routine traffic stop. This vehicle (see bottom picture) was equipped with an ICOP Model 20/20®.

A high speed pursuit, at speeds of 126 mph, (according to the ICOP video) ensued resulting in a major traffic accident between the suspect driving the Sheriff's patrol vehicle and a local police department patrol vehicle (top picture). The K-9 was ejected and killed. The suspect was ejected as well, but survived.

Rugged and reliable, the ICOP Model 20/20 also survived this accident unscathed and never stopped recording, while the competitive in-car video system installed in the police car stopped on impact. The suspect went to trial in early 2008 on six felony charges. He was convicted and sentenced to 74 years.

OFFICER IN FOCUS:

Chief Ed Nathanson, Lady Lake Police Department, Florida

Known to most in Central Florida as simply "Chief Ed," Brooklyn, New York-born Ed Nathanson has led the Lady Lake Police Department as Chief of Police for nearly 12 years. With jurisdiction over the local township, LLPD also shares jurisdiction with five other area agencies over The Villages—the largest, single-site, 55+ retirement development in the U.S.

A tough law man with a self-professed soft spot for kids, the elderly and, of course, cutting edge police technologies, Chief Ed first joined the LLPD in 1981 when he was barely 18 years old after his parents moved the family down from New York to take ownership of a local fishing camp. According to Chief Ed, "When I joined the force, we had to hand crank our sirens and carry a roll of dimes so we could use the payphone."

A lot has changed at LLPD since then under Chief Ed's capable watch. Today, the department boasts—among other high tech innovations—a state-of-the-art training facility; a nationally-ranked, award-winning K-9 division; a fleet of patrol cars fully equipped with MDT's and ICOP Model 20/20-W digital in-car video systems;

fingerprint scanners; a customized dispatch and 911 call center with hydraulic desks to enhance comfort over long shifts; and a brand new kitchen, where Chief Ed regularly cooks real home-cooked meals for his officers and department staffers. "We live in a different world now—one that mandates the use of police technologies to enable us to do more with less."

It was Chief Ed's appreciation for the powerful role that technology now plays in law enforcement that led him to envision and then petition the Florida State Legislature to pass The Florida Technology Bill — a clever alternative for raising funds to purchase police technologies. Although the Bill currently appears to be stalled in legislative red tape, it is 'out of the box' thinking like this that helps to define why Chief Ed is widely considered extraordinary by everyone who meets him.

When ICOP first encountered Chief Ed, he really put us to task to differentiate the ICOP Model 20/20-W from our competitors.

"As the chief executive of the department, I am mandated to be a very good steward of our taxpayer's dollars. I could not afford to go with just any in-car video solution that failed to

offer integrity of video, admissibility of video, officer safety, robust capability and longevity (unlike 'melt-a-cams' that used to literally melt if left in the car on a hot day). As I quickly discovered, only ICOP was able to deliver."

He also noted that in Lake County, Florida, the State Attorney will no longer prosecute a DUI case unless the agency has the offender on video, because without it, they can no longer get a conviction. "So, it is now mandatory—if we bring a DUI case, we better have the ICOP video."

When asked what advice he'd give a young adult considering a career in law enforcement—he thoughtfully offered, "First you need to search your soul—and if you find loyalty, honor, dedication and a commitment to total professionalism, then you should consider being a cop....because that is what it's going to take."

Always quick to share one of his 'Ed-isms,' such as "together, we can make a difference," or "it takes a million drops of water to fill a bucket, but until you put in the first drop, it will never be filled," Chief Ed says he plans to remain with the LLPD for "ten more years, or one bad day." Let's hope that bad day never comes.

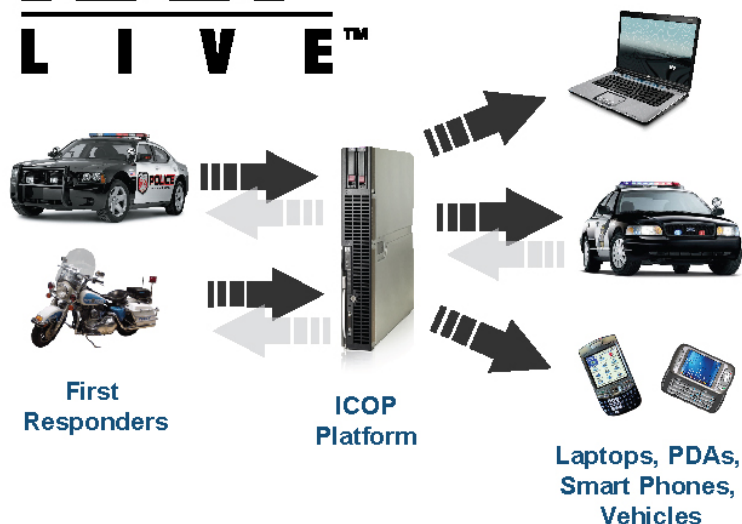

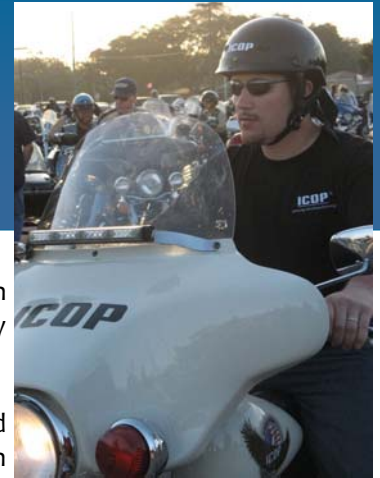
The **ICOP Model 4000** was developed in response to growing industry demand for on-board digital surveillance of municipal, commercial and school buses.
